## Mushrooms flourish in Frankfort in the form of leaders

A suburban police department (above) has been accused by one of its police officers of discrimination. The discrimination revolves around a pregnant officer being denied reasonable job accommodations, such as providing a properly fitted protective vest, and forcing her to go on leave months before her child was due to be born.

She is a 14-year veteran and tried, with her union, to negotiate temporary modifications to her patrol duties and equipment.

This has been a never-ending problem with some police chiefs and municipalities over the years, but most put away their Neanderthal thinking and provide some benefits for pregnant officers. It is the right thing to do.

But not Frankfort PD. Allegedly, according to the lawsuit, Chief John Burica refused to discuss accommodations for this pregnant officer. He was reported to have said that duty assignments (modified) were only available to officers injured on the job. He did not want to set precedent for pregnant officers.

One may ask how many pregnant officers does Frankfort have? He also reportedly said he only had to treat her "like someone with a broken leg whose injury occurred during off-duty." I ask, if he is treating her like she

The department also refused her request for altered body armor to protect her unborn baby. Instead, they gave her two ill-fitting men's shirts and one pair of non-maternity pants. She had to buy her own suspenders to keep the pants up.

This would be funny if it wasn't so chickenshit. She was forced to take an early leave, too, losing accrued benefit time.

Frankfort village administrator Rob Piscia said he could not comment on the pending lawsuits, except for "The village has complied with all laws and the collective bargaining agreement." Fast fact, Rob, you can provide a little extra for your cops in these circumstances without any issues. It's called kindness. No one would complain.

While he couldn't or wouldn't comment much, he gave out the usual pablum about a discrimination-free workplace in Frankfort. Is there some implicit bias towards pregnant women then?

The good news including the officer's lawsuit pending is that her and her husband (a sergeant at Frankfort) are the parents of a healthy baby boy.

I don't think they named him after her chief. Good luck officers.

Apparently, the ex-mayor challenged one of the umpire's calls when he called a foul ball as the little girl swung and missed. It's about giving them confidence. It's harmless and no one I have ever heard of suffered long term angst by giving a kid a break.

## Federal Freeloaders

That's what liberal writer Eric Zorn called those union employees who wish not to pay fair share union dues. This comes on the heels in the news that the US Supreme Court will hear arguments on the earlier case that resulted in a 4 - 4 tie a couple of years ago after Justice Scalia passed away.

A 4 - 4 tie means that the Abood ruling of 30+ years, preserving fair share dues and rules on this issue, would stand. Now *Janus vs AFSCME* will dominate SCOTUS once more, as the court considers abolishing this guarantee for union participation.

I don't always agree with Zorn but he is a thoughtful without animus reporter whose opinions I respect.

But I loved reading that 28 states in the US have what they refer to as right-to-work rules which gives them a title of right-to-freeload states. Well said, well said. Couldn't agree more.

As the founder of this union and the former boss, you know where I stand. It is only fair and just that those in a union who receive the benefits and protection of a collective bargaining agreement but allow those few members too cheap and ignorant to pay their fair share of union dues to receive these benefits.

When they refuse to accept wages and benefits bargained for by unions or seek legal protection, then I will

It's like Mr. Zorn states, the big stick is cutting the freeloader altogether from the union and letting them negotiate their own deals with the bosses. It probably won't happen, however. 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# At your ULP hearing

You've filed a ULP (unfair labor practice) charge against your employer, alleging a violation of good faith bargaining or other procedural violations of a contract under the Act (ILRB).

It is important to note that the Executive Director of the ILRB sets the time and location of the hearing. Not you, your union, or the employer are entitled to do so. Once set, the "neutral chairman or administrative law judge (ALJ) shall preside over the meeting and receive testimony."

In short, the Executive Director of the ILRB will determine that a ULP contains the proper issues of law and then sets the hearing to resolve those issues in dispute.

The hearing is a formal affair of opening statements of both parties, submission of exhibits and evidence, cross examination by the union and

employer, rebuttals, and closing statements by the union and the employer.

Remember, the charging party (you in this instance) has the burden of proof that the allegations have in fact occurred. The hearing will be transcribed by one of our agreed upon steno people and costs are divided equally — usually. Post hearing briefs are standard unless agreed to an oral argument only.

After the ALJ examines the case, the record, and evidence, he or she will issue a recommended decision, usually within 30 days. NOT! They take longer, sometimes longer than the Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's season. The ALJ and God work in strange and mysterious ways. Be patient.

Eventually, that day comes and you get the award. If you win, you're happy. If you lose, you aren't. Same goes for

the Dark Side.

So the ALJ, understanding that no one will ever believe the other side is right, will allow the loser to file exceptions. This is an appeal to the full ILRB, who will then review the transcription and facts entered into the hearing and make a decision to confirm the award decision or overturn same. But the Memorial Day holiday, and the 4th of July will most likely pass before you hear either way.

But after the original hearing, if no exceptions are filed, the order becomes a non-precedential decision of the Board. Case closed.

So that's it. Not too difficult, but it can be very time consuming. The most important thing to remember is that you who are filing the charge will be called upon to testify and provide evidence because after all, the ULP is about you.

### Reptile Lives Matter

A really sad death

Not a happy story here for a man who likes snakes.

David Hohs was struck by a rattler while hiking in Pennsylvania. There was a lot to admire in this young man. He struggled with depression and bi-polar disorder only to become a triathlete ironman.

This was surprising, since rattlesnake bites are rarely fatal in the US. Each year there are numerous venomous bites, of which this year, 12 were fatal, for a fatality rate of 0.15 percent.

And a person in good shape, like Mr. Hohs, would have even better survival odds. But he died about 30 minutes later after being air-lifted to the hospital. Paramedics could not find the reptile for identification purposes.

Knowing something about these deadly creatures, I can tell you the potential harm for any victim depends on two things: The type of venom delivered and the amount of venom injected.

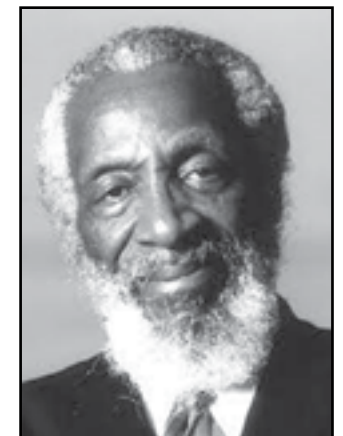

# Firefighters do it better

That's right, I said it. In fact the small town volunteer fire departments do it best. What do they do? They take care of each other and themselves. They debrief after each critical incident they handle. They talk about what went well, what went bad, and what images they would like to erase from their mind.

What do we do? We get back in our squad, by ourselves, and go to the same domestic battery call we go to every week. You know the one. The one where the couple wants you to fix 10 years of abuse in five minutes.

Sean Riley, the founder of Safe Call Now, recently spoke at our annual seminar. He talked about how we are trained to do the job the vast majority of the population are unwilling or unable to do.

Think about it. There are 325 million people in the United States, of which only 765,000 are sworn law enforcement officers. That's 0.2%. We take 0.2% of the general population and train them to not think like the rest of the population.

We train your brain to do the exact opposite of what other people's brains tell them to do. We train you to run toward the gunfire, run toward the danger, and go down into the dark basement where someone is screaming for help. We train you to have a "Warrior Mindset." Then at the end of a 12-hour shift, we expect you to turn it all off, forget everything that happened, and go back and function with the other 99.8% of the population. We are very good at training you how to do the job, but we have zero training on how to go home at night.

That's why the firemen have it right. They talk about things with each other. We don't. In fact, until a few years ago, we weren't even allowed to talk about getting help for ourselves. We would go home, kick the dog for tearing up the house (because we have been gone for 12-hours), trip on the kid's toys (and yell at them), and dismiss your spouses' question of "How was your day?" Then we grab a six pack (which later turns into a 12-pack, and then a bottle of booze) and go down to the basement or out to the garage

and stare at the TV while we try to get our mind around what happened during the day. Well, actually, we are trying to bury it so we don't have to deal with it. If we don't get help, if we don't acknowledge we see horrible things no human should ever have to see, we end up becoming a hidden statistic of police officer suicide. We lose more fellow officers by our own hand than by that of offenders. There are great programs like Below 100, which work on getting line of duty deaths under 100 each year. Yet we have nothing to try to get the number of suicides under 100. According to Badge of Life, we lose one fellow officer every 81 hours to suicide.

If you are struggling or you know someone who is, Safe Call Now is a hotline staffed by and for first responders. They have a strong reputation for helping first responders get the help they need. They will listen to you and give you some guidance on how to help yourself out of the hole you are in. If it is serious, they can find a treatment center out of state and allow the officer to keep their FOID card and return to work.

Let's start taking care of each other off duty as well as we do it on duty. Stay Safe.
